What is Comprehensive Cancer Control?

Comprehensive Cancer Control is a collaborative process through which a community pools resources to reduce the burden of cancer that results in: risk reduction, early detection, better treatment and enhanced survivorship. This program is funded through a grant from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to the Department of Public Health & Social Services.

This is NOT a direct service program. Instead, this program focuses on bringing representatives from the cancer network on Guam (public, private and non-profit organizations as well as individuals) together to address prevention, early detection and treatment, survivorship, data & research, and policy & advocacy issues faced by cancer patients, survivors, caregivers, and families on Guam.

This group of partners is called the Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Coalition.

Why is this program needed?

In Guam, over the past 15 years, there has been an increase in the number of new cancer cases (incidence) and deaths (mortality) due to cancer.

Data indicate that the cancer burden is rising. Both cancer incidence and mortality have increased over the 3 time-periods for cancer data collection: 1998-2002, 2003-2007, and 2008-2012. Between 2008-2012, 1904 new cases of cancer were diagnosed, and 736 people died of cancer. Thus, cancer incidence increased by 20% and cancer deaths increased 2.6% from the previous 5-year period. On average, this translates to 1 new case of cancer diagnosed each day, and 1 person dying of cancer every 2.5 days. Five cancers account for majority of Guam's cancer burden: breast cancer, colorectal cancer, liver cancer, lung and bronchus cancer, and prostate cancer. 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What are some of the CCC Coalition's accomplishments?

- Publication of Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Plan, 2007-2012, 2013-2017, and 2018-2022.
- Publication of the Guam Cancer Facts and Figures, 2003-2007 and 2008-2012.
- Publication of the revised Guam Cancer Passport: A Guide to Survivorship and Care
- Publication of the Guam Cancer Control Coalition Quarterly Newsletters.
- Creation of the Hope Project Video and various cancer prevention commercials.
- Coordination of Palliative Care Conferences, "Celebrate Life!" Cancer
 Survivors Conferences; and cancer educations on Breast, Cervical, and Colorectal Cancers.
- Promotion of evidence-based cancer screening guidelines (U.S. Preventive Services Task Force) to majority of Guam's healthcare providers.
- Advocates for policy change such as the tobacco tax increase for tobacco products; sales ban of electronic cigarettes to minors; and strengthening the Natasha Protection Act.
- Winner of several prestigious national and local awards such as C-Change and the MagPRO Awards.
