Celebrate Life! Cancer Survivors Conference

The annual *Celebrate Life! Cancer Survivors Conference* was held on June 8, 2019 at Pacific Star Resort and Spa. Participants had an opportunity to learn from topics that focused on three phases of survivorship: Living with, through and beyond a cancer diagnosis.

Marissa David Peroy, a cancer survivor who did the opening remarks, shared her cancer journey. Linda Frank, Yoga for Cancer Trained Teacher, conducted a short yoga session. Durado Brooks, MD MPH, Vice President, Cancer Control Interventions, Prevention, and Early Detection, American Cancer Society, talked about life after cancer treatment – practical ways of dealing with problems and guidelines for managing physical, social, and emotional health. He also shared useful tools and resources for cancer patients such as the survivorship care plan and survivorship care guideline. Proclamation Signing

On October 4, 2018, Governor Eddie Baza Calvo proclaimed October as Breast Cancer Awareness Month in a Proclamation Signing at the Governor's Office, Large Conference Room, Adelup. The theme for this year was "Girls Fight Tough. Tough Boys Wear Pink" to demonstrate that men do get breast cancer too. The program included Dr. Delores Lee, a family medicine doctor who did a short talk on breast cancer screening. A representative from the Guam Cancer Registry addressed the current breast cancer data. The reading of the Proclamation by Kristine Zabala-Dulla, daughter of Ms. Roselie Zabala, to honor her memory as well as to recognize her invaluable leadership to the Bureau of Community Health Services.

Various community partners came together to show their support and raise awareness of the disease. The event was coordinated by the Guam Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program, in partnership with the Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Program and Coalition, and the Non-Communicable Disease Consortium.

TakeCare's 1 in 8 Breast Cancer Screening and Awareness Campaign

In collaboration with FHP Health Center, TakeCare's Breast Cancer Screening and Awareness campaign held last year from September 1st to November 30th, 2018 successfully screened over 600 women through breast mammography. With the support from American Cancer Society, health education collaterals were distributed to members and strategically placed at FHP clinic. TakeCare also collaborated with Zumba instructors to organize a cancer dance fundraiser which raised over \$5,000 to benefit Guam Cancer Care.

Guam Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program Outreaches

The Guam Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program (GBCCEDP) staff conducted and participated in several health outreaches during the month of October – six recruitment outreaches to all big supermarkets and enrolled 39 eligible women for the program; two health fairs and recruited 12 eligible women; extended outreach by the Bureau of Family Health and Nursing Services and enrolled 3 women; and a special Saturday clinic at FHP Health Center and screened 52 women for breast and cervical cancer. In addition, staff provided a presentation on the importance of breast, cervical and colorectal cancer screenings, to a total of 20 employees of Triple J.

Guam's Real Men Wear Pink

The American Cancer Society Guam Field Office moved into a new office space in June 2018. The new office on the second floor of the Nanbo Building in Hagatna has allowed them to create a wig closet, a space for patients to try on head coverings like wigs, hats and scarves, in private. Also in 2018, the American Cancer Society established a breast cancer gift closet – providing post-surgical bras and foam prosthetics to women who need them.

In October 2018, 8 men participated in Guam's Real Men Wear Pink campaign. Breast cancer doesn't affect women alone, thousands of men are diagnosed with the disease in the nation every year, and so are more than 266,000 of their daughters, wives, mothers, sisters and friends. The Real Men Wear Pink campaign is meant to engage and empower male community leaders in the fight to end breast cancer. Each Real Men Wear Pink participant accepts a fundraising challenge and competes to be the top fundraiser among his peers by the end of the campaign. 2018 candidates included Dr. Felix Cabrera, Guam Regional Medical City; Jon Nathan Denight, Guam Visitors Bureau; Tom Garcia, Chevrolet, Atkins Kroll; Glen Noket, Hafa Adai Specialist Group; Steven Pangelinan, Department of Education; Dr. Joel Rubio, Health Partners, LLC; Joseph San Agustin, Department of Revenue and Taxation; and Francis E. Santos, Global Healthcare, Inc. The top fundraiser in 2018 was Dr. Joel Rubio, raising \$6,461. In total, 8 candidates raised \$26,691.67.


On January 11, 2019, the Department of Public Health and Social Services' Guam Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program and the Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Program along with its partners, coordinated the Cervical Cancer Awareness Month Proclamation Signing at the Governor's Office, Large Conference Room, Adelup. This was an opportunity to raise awareness and encourage women across the nation to get screened for cervical cancer; and to promote the importance of having girls and boys get vaccinated for human papillomavirus (HPV) at an appropriate age.

The program included remarks from our newly elected Governor Lourdes A. Leon Guerrero and Lt. Governor Joshua F. Tenorio. Dr. Rachael Consoli, OB-GYN, FHP Health Center, shared information on the importance of cervical cancer screening and HPV vaccination. Ms. Renata Bordallo, Data Collection Specialist, Guam Cancer Registry, presented the current Guam data on cervical cancer. The reading of the proclamation by Ms. Cathy Rivera Castro, Vice Chairperson, Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Coalition.

In line with the proclamation signing, several activities for the month were organized by the Guam Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program: Five recruitment outreaches to various supermarkets, and was able to enroll 37 eligible women; a cancer education presentation at three villages, sponsored by the Walk to Wellness Program; and the 2019 Cervical Cancer Conference.

Cervical Cancer Conference

The Guam Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program (GBCCEDP) hosted the Cervical Cancer Conference on January 27, 2019 at the Pacific Star Resort and Spa. The conference covered topics such as cervical cancer screening, HPV Vaccination, diagnosis and treatment of cervical cancer. The Guam Nurses Association provided 4 contact hours of continuing education credits, and the Guam Medical Society provided 4 contact hours of continuing medical education credits for healthcare professionals who attended.

The conference had four main presentations: Cervical Cancer Screening and Cancer Prevention through HPV Vaccination (Delores J. U. Lee, MD, Evergreen); What Every Woman Should Know about Cancer (Maria Julieta V. Germar, MD, FPOGS, FSGOP, FPSCPC, St. Luke's Medical Cancer Global City); Cervical Cancer and Radiation Treatment (Song-Chu Arthur Ko, MD, PhD, Guam Regional Medical City); and Chemotherapy in Cervical Cancer (Paul Coty, MD, Guam Regional Medical City).

At the end of the conference, Lawrence Alam and Angelina Mummert from the Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Coalition's Screening, Early Detection and Treatment and Prevention Action Teams launched the Cervical Cancer and HPV Vaccine Toolkit.

Out of the 119 participants, 60 received their continuing education credits and 19 received their continuing medical education credits. Overall, the conference was well-attended. Healthcare professionals were challenged to think about how their clinics are promoting cervical cancer prevention and screening.


Colorectal Cancer Screening and Prevention Campaign

In celebration of Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month last March, TakeCare launched its first annual Colorectal Cancer Screening, Awareness and Prevention Campaign from March 1st to May 31st. The goal of the campaign is to increase colorectal cancer (CRC) screening using fecal occult blood test (FOBT) to qualified TakeCare members ages 50 to 75 years. This project is in relation to the grant awarded by the American Cancer Society West Region (WER) Cancer Control Collaborative Project (CCCP) to increase CRC screenings.

TakeCare is pleased to announce that as a result of this project, over 130 TakeCare members completed Colorectal Cancer screening using Fecal occult blood test (FOBT) during the campaign period.

In connection to this campaign, TakeCare recognizes one of its network primary provider for having achieved the highest number of patients who completed CRC screenings (using all types of CRC screenings available such as the Fecal occult blood test (FOBT), Fecal immunochemical test (FIT) or FIT-DNA, Sigmoidoscopy, or Colonoscopy) during the campaign period.

These toolkits were designed to support community stakeholders and partners by providing them with the most current evidenced based strategies which we hope will lead to improvements and enhancements in systems of care and clinical practices.

#KNOWYOURKULU - Colorectal Cancer Awareness Outreach Kicked Off at UOG Charter Day

UOG Cancer Research Center along with coalition partners celebrated cancer "#KnowYourKulu," a colorectal cancer (CRC) awareness outreach during UOG Charter Day on March 12, 2019. Over 250 students, UOG staff and families participated in the outreach and learned about colorectal cancer as they were treated to a guided tour of Kulu, the giant inflatable colon. Kulu is an educational tool used to increase knowledge about colorectal cancer and screening. A research study was initiated to evaluate the effectiveness of Kulu and included administration of a short survey as well as pre- and post-test on intent to screen, CRC knowledge, and effectiveness of the inflatable colon as an educational tool. A total of 100 participants who attended the event volunteered to be part of the study.



UOG Cancer Research Center's Community Outreach Core (COC) coordinated the event assisted by social work research students. Several COC partners (American Cancer Society, Guam Cancer Care, Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Coalition, Public Health's Tobacco Control Program and Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Program, UOG's PICCAH, BENIT, Kick Butts group) set up displays and exhibits to promote cancer screening and healthy lifestyles. 80% in Every Community - Colorectal Cancer Screening Campaign

The 80% in Every Community is a National Colorectal Cancer Roundtable campaign which continues its efforts to increase colorectal cancer screening rates to 80% or higher, across the nation. The Guam Cancer Coalition has made a commitment to also continue its work of promoting colorectal cancer screenings to help increase our local rates, which lags when compared to national averages.



On March 14, 2019, members of the Guam Cancer Coalition met with Dr. Thomas W. Krise, President of the University of Guam, to discuss colorectal cancer initiatives. Dr. Krise signed the 80% in Every Community pledge.



On April 17, 2019, Guam Cancer Coalition partners (American Cancer Society, University of Guam Cancer Research Center, and Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Program) attended the press conference on colorectal cancer awareness campaign and 80% in Every Community pledge signing by FHP Health Center.

Guam Walkability Program: Updates

Since the beginning of 2019, the Guam Walkability Program has been working really hard to promote its initiatives in the community. Ms. Leah Metra, Project Coordinator of the program, held several meetings with various stakeholders and partners such as the Mangilao Mayor's Office and the Rotary Club of Tumon Bay in an effort to get their support and buy in for the program. Ms. Metra is currently working on the program's Communications Plan. The plan will assist in ensuring that communication strategies utilized by the program are effective.

Walk to Wellness Program

The Walk to Wellness Program funded by the Guam Cancer Trust Fund has run for over 2 years, covering five villages with 133 participants. The team was able to collaborate with 8 organizations and local government agencies. Due to the interest of these and other local organizations, the faculty of the University of Guam Cooperative Extension and Outreach and the Research Corporation of the University of Guam were successful in securing an additional \$124,000 in local funds to leverage this effort. This will allow the program to continue with an additional 4-6 villages over the next 1½-2 years.

A key impact of this program is that the 133 total participants received training and education from various partners such as the Guam Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program, Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Program, Tobacco Prevention and Control Program, Diabetes Prevention and Control Program, SNAP-Ed food trainings, STD/HIV Program, Guam WIC Program, and the Guam Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System. These efforts were conducted to increase awareness on cancer prevention and control; increase physical activity; and increase fruit and vegetable consumption.

From a social environment standpoint, another impact was that the participants walked a total of 60,000,192 total steps, with an average of 451,129 individual steps. This translates to a total of 30,000 miles (assuming 2000 steps=1 mile), where each participant averaged about 225.6 miles, increasing their physical activity.

Lastly, another important impact was on built environments. Each village was successful in identifying and utilizing a walking trail by the village cohort. As of today, these trails continue to be utilized by village residents. This alone represents a significant environmental change supporting physical activity for each village.

The program's success exceeded the planned objectives. Local agencies demonstrated their perceived worth/value of the program and the need for replication, thereby securing an additional \$124,000 of local funding to continue the program. Sustainability will partially be dependent on the positive and permanent changes the program has on the built and social environments.







SPARK Training to Daycare Centers and Schools By Dr. Clare Camacho and Lawrence Alam

The Department of Public Health and Social Services' Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Program and the University of Guam's Professional International Programs entered into a partnership to provide training on physical activity to three daycare centers (Mercy Heights Nursery and Kindergarten, Nene Child Care Center, and Tender Shepherd Child Care Center) and two schools (M.U. Lujan Elementary School and Science is Fun and Awesome Learning Academy) on Guam. The purpose was to train teachers and caregivers on implementing evidence-based physical activity strategies into their daily routine. A total of 26 caregivers at the three centers were trained and received certificates of participation; 29 teachers and staff at the two schools were also trained where 18 opted for two professional credits while 11 opted for certificates. This project promotes the prevention and reduction of exposure to cancer risk factors. Since children attend school and are at daycare centers for a majority of their day, integrating physical activity within the school day is critical. Providing this at the early childhood and school level is also critical since children form healthy habits early in life. With a very promising project, the team will continue to provide trainings to more schools and daycare centers this year, addressing obesity prevention at the forefront.

Guam Hypertension Prevention and Control Program: Year 2

The main objective of the Hypertension Prevention and Control Program is to improve the health of patients with hypertension with the guidance of the Association of State and Territorial Health Associations (ASTHO) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Through the program, the team refers patients with hypertension into a system of care so that they can achieve real improvement in their blood pressure numbers. A component of this system is the Passport to Hypertension Services, where the team works to provide linkages from the clinical to community-based health programs.

Partnerships were formed in 2017 with the Guam

Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program, Guam Regional Medical City, Guam Memorial Hospital Authority, and the Northern and Southern Region Community Health Centers to identify patients that can be part of the program. Patients were seen at Health Partners LLC. Over 89% of the program participants had normalized blood pressure results upon their third visit.

In the second phase of the program this 2019, focus was on expansion from Health Partners LLC to the Northern and Southern Community Health Centers. The program continues to pilot solutions for patients struggling with affording laboratory tests, medication, and transportation. With the Passport to Hypertension Services, patients are also encouraged to attend supportive programs that help with the management of their blood pressure, including educational workshops, exercise programs, smoking cessation programs and nutrition programs.

Guam Telehealth Project: Tele-ECHO Session Fridays

The Guam Telehealth Project is a three-year long project under the Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Program, implemented in partnership with the University of Hawaii (UH) and Guam's Alternative Lifestyle Association. The project aims to increase cancer-related services by using the Telehealth platform to provide further training, education, and collaborative opportunities for health care providers and community health workers on Guam.

TeleECHO Fridays are offered by the project. These are learning sessions held every third Friday of the month. Speakers discuss cancer-related topics with participants using Zoom as an online meeting platform. Sessions are open to medical professionals and practitioners, cancer survivors and caregivers, and all who are interested.

Guam Health Providers Cancer Symposium Draws 86 Health Providers

On Sunday, June 9, 2019, the University of Guam Cancer Research Center hosted its second biennial Guam Health Providers Cancer Symposium at the Westin Guam Resort. The symposium was open to all health professionals who were interested in learning more about colorectal cancer and oral cancer. A total of 86 individuals attended the symposium, which was entitled "YOU are the Key to Cancer Prevention."

Mr. Frankie Perez, a cancer survivor who was diagnosed with colorectal cancer at 38 years of age, shared his cancer journey and stressed the importance of having doctors listen to their patients, and screen for colorectal cancer (CRC) even when their patient isn't 50 years of age and older, or at higher risk for CRC. He was featured in a video, "Frankie's Story – Hope is CRC Screening", produced by the UOG Cancer Research Center's Community Outreach Core (COC), that was shown at the symposium as an educational tool to promote CRC screening.

Other highlights of the event included keynote presentations by Durado Brooks, MD, MPH, Vice President of Cancer Control Intervention for the American Cancer Society, on current colorectal cancer screening guidelines and proven best practices that health providers can use to increase CRC screening in their clinics. Dr. Yvette Paulino, an Associate Professor (Epidemiology) in the University of Guam's Health Sciences Program, spoke on the incidence of colorectal cancer and oral cancer in Guam, and shared data on risk factors, and low cancer screening rates of Guam's people; and Dr. Tressa P. Diaz, an Assistant Professor at the Division of Social Work, School of Nursing and Health Sciences at the University of Guam, spoke on "Attitudes and Beliefs About CRC Screening" based on information gathered from individual interviews and focus groups with Guam residents. Lastly, Lawrence Williams, MD, a board certified Otolaryngologist (ENT Surgeon) and active duty naval officer who works at US Naval Hospital Guam as the Department Head of Otolaryngology – Head and Neck Surgery, presented on "Understanding Oral Cancer – Facts, Risk Factors, Prevention, Early Detection and Screening."

Additional educational resources were made available to health providers with the official launching and distribution of the 'CRC Toolkit for Health Providers', a project led by the Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Coalition. Ms. Vivian Pareja, Public Information Officer, Public Health's Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Program provided a short orientation on the toolkit.

The symposium for Guam's health providers is a collaborative effort of the University of Guam Cancer Research Center, American Cancer Society, Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Coalition, Department of Public Health Social Services, Guam Medical Society, and Guam Nurses Association.

8.0 Hour Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services Training

The Guam Office of Minority Health (GOMH) is a program within the Guam Department of Public Health and Social Services. GOMH exists to eliminate racial and ethnic disparities, with a focus on under-served and under-represented communities of Guam and the region.

The GOMH Program works in cross-collaboration with government agencies, the private sector and with stakeholders in the promotion and provision of the 8.0 Hour Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services (CLAS) Trainings. The CLAS mandates are U.S. federal requirements that support compliance with the Civil Rights Act of 1964. This training will also use local and regional applications of cultural and linguistic competence to increase the quality of services provided to diverse populations.

Guam has a very rich and diverse multi-lingual and multi-cultural community. In order to make health and social services successful for service providers, GOMH offers the CLAS trainings. These CLAS Trainings help inform and guide service providers in being culturally and linguistically sensitive to their patients and clients. This, in turn, helps to provide opportunities to significantly improve health and social services outcomes. As a result, an improved quality of living is realized throughout the communities served.

The Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Coalition strongly supports the CLAS Trainings through critical funding opportunities. This enables the Coalition to strengthen the provision of quality service delivery with the many community partners and collaborative organizations in the fight against cancer. In the first few months of 2019, the Guam Comprehensive Cancer Control Program provided over 155 participants to complete the 8.0 Hour CLAS Trainings to health care providers, clinicians and educators.

The CLAS Trainings are highly experiential and help to build skills in working effectively with Guam's very highly diverse community, especially in the fight against health disparities worsened by cancer and other diseases. GOMH has consistently been providing the 8.0 Hour CLAS Training Sessions since 2009 with over 4,000 Guam participants that have completed the session.


