A. PROGRAM OPERATIONS

PERSONNEL ACTION

MS, Shelter Manager was on personal leave from September 9, 2013 to October 11, 2013.

JN, Shelter Worker was on personal leave from November 1 - 27, 2013 due to military duty.

RLG, Shelter Worker resigned on November 8, 2013.

MG, Shelter Worker was on personal leave from October 28, 2013 – November 11, 2013.

A new Shelter Worker was hired and started work on December 1, 2013.

Shelter Worker was on Military leave from 12/10 – 20/13, then personal leave from 12/24 – 1/4/14.

NUMBER OF CLIENTS

The count of the clients for this reporting quarter was two hundred twenty-four (224) adults and children who reside in the following Guma San Jose, Homeless Emergency Shelters.

Main Shelter at Catalina Lane, Dededo	(97) adults	(102) children
Men Shelter at Chapel Road, Barrigada	(25) adult males	

There were fifty (50) families for this reporting quarter.

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October 23, 2013 - Kusinan Santa Barbara sponsored their monthly dinner serving held at their parish hall.

October 24, 2013 - Department of Public Health and Social Services nurses, along with student nurses from the U.O.G. School of Nursing, conducted an outreach where they checked blood pressure, blood glucose, provided flu and tetanus shots to clients and staff.

October 25, 2013 - Island Telephone Directory sponsored a dinner serving held at CSS main conference room.

October 31, 2013 – Program Manager had a meeting/training with Guma San Jose staff regarding Documentation (incidents, log book, daily disposition, progress notes, etc.) and regular intake and ER.

November 7, 2013 - Three clients attended a Money Management class held at the Salvation Army in Tiyan. They were given certificates of completion. When applying for housing, clothing and food at the TSA, clients are required to complete the class.

November 09, 2013 - Andersen Air Force Base Airman Leadership School Class had 14 volunteers assisted the shelter clear out the planter raised garden and planted bitter melons and wing beans seeds at Guma San Jose Dededo.

November 13, 2013 - Kusinan Santa Barbara sponsored their monthly dinner serving held at their parish hall.

November 21, 2013 - Nine clients attended a money management class held at Salvation Army in Tiyan. They were given certificates of completion. (Required before applying for assistance)

November 22, 2013 - Island Telephone Directory sponsored a Thanksgiving dinner held at the CSS main conference room.

November 23, 2013 - Andersen Air Force Base O.S.S. 36th, Joshua Clements along with friends and family sponsored a Thanksgiving luncheon held at Guma San Jose, Dededo.

November 24, 2013 - Guam Spirit, Guahan Luta, Rock Lions Club sponsored a Thanksgiving dinner held at Guma San Jose, Dededo. They also provided complimentary toiletries to all the clients.

November 25, 2013 – PM and a SM were on the K-57 Radio Talk Show about GSJ with a CSS Board Member.

November 26, 2013 - Acts 2 Church sponsored a Thanksgiving dinner held at Guma San Jose, Dededo. They also provided complimentary toiletries to all the clients.

November 27, 2013 – The three managers for GSJ had a meeting to prepare for the November 29, 2013 GSJ staff meeting.

November 28, 2013 - Clients were transported to the Salvation Army Thanksgiving luncheon held at the Pavilion, Chamorro Village in Hagatha.

November 28, 2013 - Gemma Mustard Seed sponsored a Thanksgiving dinner held at Guma San Jose in Dededo. They also provided complimentary toiletries to all the clients.

November 29, 2013 – PM had a meeting with the Guma San Jose staff regarding documentation or logging, progress notes and incident reports. Questions to be answered are who, what, where, when and why. November staff birthdays was also celebrated with a cake.

November 30, 2013 - Taitingfong Family sponsored a Thanksgiving dinner held at Guma San Jose in Dededo.

December 1, 2013 Yoli & Jeff Takai sponsored a dinner serving held at GSJ lanai.

December 7, 2013 Saint John Episcopal Church sponsored a holiday dinner serving held at their fellowship hall.

December 11, 2013 Kusinan Santa Barbara sponsored their monthly dinner serving held at their parish hall. The children were given ice cream and gifts. The clients received a gift basket filled with assorted canned and dry goods.

December 12, 2013 Saint Thomas Aquinas Catholic School sponsored a dinner serving held at GSJ lanai.

December 14, 2013 John Dillard, along with friends and family, came to Guma San Jose to sing Christmas songs to the clients.

December 15, 2013 Salas families sponsored a dinner serving held at GSJ lanai.

December 17, 2013 New Covenant Life Church sponsored a dinner serving held at GSJ lanai.

December 20, 2013 Benavente Middle School Epic Club students, with their advisor/teacher Lawrence Batangan, visited the facility. They sang Christmas songs and gave donations to the clients.

December 22, 2013 Guahan Luta Lion Club sponsored a dinner serving held at GSJ lanai.

December 25, 2013 Guma San Jose staff held a Christmas luncheon for the clients at the lanai.

December 28, 2013 Taitingfong families sponsored a dinner serving held at GSJ lanai. They also provided gifts to the clients.

TRAINING/CONFERENCE

November 23, 2013 – Five (5) staff members attended a Crisis Prevention Intervention (CPI) training held at CSS main conference room.

December 21, 2013 - Program Manager and a Shelter Worker attended a Pesticide Training at CSS main conference room.

December 28, 2013 - Two Shelter Workers attended Crisis Prevention Intervention (CPI) training held at CSS main conference room. The training was conducted by Mr. Pete Cruz of Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center.

C. SERVICES PROVIDED:

Twenty (20) cases or thirty-nine (39) individuals were provided with one thousand four hundred seventy-nine (1479) meals. Forty-one (41) cases or ninety-one (91) individuals were provided with three hundred twenty (320) transportation services. The clients made a total of nine hundred twenty (920) phone calls.

These transportation services were provided to and from the office/shelter, job sites, job search, job interviews, Catholic Social Service Office, home search, workshops, sponsored dinners, Salvation Army, Mayor's Office, Superior Court, Guam Public Guardian, DPHSS, GMHA, DMHSA, AHRD, DOL, DOE, DISID, GHURA, super markets, etc.

Follow ups were made to GHURA, Salvation Army on applications for housing assistance. Follow ups were made on applications submitted to various employers for employment via phone calls and transporting clients to the job sites.

D. ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

Twenty-nine (29) cases or seventy-three (73) individuals were able to rent on their own or find a place with family or friends, or accepted into a housing program:

Eighteen (18) cases or fifty-four (54) individuals found a place with family and or friends.

Four (4) case or ten (10) individuals were accepted into the Salvation Army Emergency Solutions Grant Program for housing assistance.

One (1) case or two (2) individuals was approved through the Department of Housing and Urban Development VA Supportive Housing Program (HUD VASH) section 8.

One (1) case or two (2) individuals was able to find an apartment to rent with the assistance of a realtor.

One (1) case or one (1) individual was accepted into OASIS Empowerment Center for residential services.

Four (4) cases or four (4) individuals moved out on their own.

E. PROGRAM FUNCTIONS:

Main Shelter at 117Catalina Lane, Dededo

Eviction

- A single female was housed on October 10, 2013. She is also a client of Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center. She was evicted on October 16, 2013. The client was unstable, admitted to a staff member that she used drugs while at the shelter, made racial remarks, violated her contract, very moody, very disruptive and did not want to follow rules.
- A family of four was housed on September 17, 2013. The male client or head of household was evicted on October 23, 2013. Client complained a lot about the rules and policies of the shelter and did not want to follow them. He was disruptive, belligerent and threatened the staff. Guam Police was called, however the clients left the shelter before the Police arrived. The client's wife and her children were given the opportunity to continue with their stay at the shelter, but client chose not to. This case was referred to CPS on October 24, 2013 for follow-up.
- A family of five was housed on October 15, 2013 and were evicted on October 17, 2013 for two consecutive days of no call, no return.
- A single female that was housed on October 4, 2013 was evicted on November 8, 2013 for noncompliance of rules and regulations.
- A single female that was housed on November 25, 2013 was evicted on November 27, 2013 for noncompliance of rules and regulations.
- There was no eviction in the month of December 2013.

Placement

A couple with three kids was housed on November 5, 2013 after being evicted from their Tamuning apartment. The wife is currently employed. The husband continues to search for employment. They were assisted by The Salvation Army Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) for housing. The family moved out of Guma San Jose on December 26, 2013 and moved into the Public Housing in Talafofo.

Five (5) cases with twenty (20) individuals were able to find a place with families and friends.

One (1) case or two (2) individuals were able to find an apartment to rent.

One (1) case or an individual was able to find employment as a security guard.

Resignation

- A single male parent decided on his own to exit the program on November 23, 2013 with his three (3) young children. A staff member witnessed client abusing one of his children, so the staff called

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GPD and CPS, they came and arrested client and took the children. One child was placed in DYA and the other two were placed in a foster home.

There was no eviction in the month of December 2013.

Program Discrepancies/ Needs

October 2013

- More than 50% of the shelter ceiling leaks (in the rooms, hallways, bathrooms, kitchens and living rooms).
 - Water bubbles is also a problem in several parts of the facility.
 - The leaks have caused electrical problems in the light fixture and ceiling fan in some rooms.
- Guma San Jose continues to communicate with GHURA and Arvin Builders regarding the leaks and problems caused by it. Arvin Builders water blasted the roof in September which created more leaks.

On October 8, 2013 the contractors started to work on the roof and then stopped because of the rains. The roof continues to leak during the heavy rains. Because of the construction starting and stopping:

- 3 rooms are still closed in the Right Wing.
- Dining area is closed in the RW.
- Living room area is closed in the RW.
- It is very challenging to work in a shelter that has more than 50% of the ceiling leaking. It's challenging to keep the floors dry and hoping that no one falls. It's a challenge to find a room that's dry when it starts raining. It's a challenge to keep clients in a shelter when all the dry rooms are taken or to put clients in a leaking room.

At this time Guma San Jose is waiting and hoping that the weather clears up, so Arvin Builders can continue fixing the leaking problems.

November 2013

- Arvin Builders stopped working at the shelter over 2 weeks ago. They need to complete the plastering of the ceiling and the painting. They also need to install the fans and light fixtures that they took down in the rooms and common areas. We will find out if the leaking problem is fixed when it starts to rain again.
- Three (3) rooms are still being closed because of the unfinished construction.
- Guma San Jose communicated the above to GHURA and Arvin Builders. Arvin Builders said that they will try to finish everything by next week. They also said that they don't have the money to finish the work.

December 2013

- Arvin Builders reported that they completed the work on the leaking roof. We'll find out if everything is fixed when the rainy season comes.
- Three (3) ACs are not working properly. The one in PM's office stopped working and the office is very hot.
- Arvin Builders need to complete the electrical work in both living rooms and in room S6. S6 is still closed.

Men's Shelter at 119 Chapel Road, Barrigada

Placement

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One (1) case or an individual was able to move in with a friend.
One (1) case or an individual secured employment and a vehicle and moved out.

Resignation

Three (3) cases or 3 individuals decided to move out. They got a house together.

Eviction - None

Urgent Concerns

- Lease expires – January 31, 2014.
- Goal – is to complete the renovations at the Ordot House and relocate there. There are 6 beds in Barrigada. The bed space will increase to 12 in Ordot.

ORDOT SHELTER, 119 TUN BIHUE STREET

The duplex at 119 Tun Bihue Street in Ordot is owned by the Archdiocese of Agana and it will be used as the Men's Shelter in January 2014.

- **COMPLETED WORK** - Power and water were connected. Meters and shutoff valves were installed.
- **ON GOING WORK** - Kitchen counter on the right wing is being worked on by a Mr. Mijares and his crew. They are donating materials and supplies for the project and also donating their time.
- **NEEDS** – Support Services has been helping with some of the plumbing work when they have time. Time is running out. January is next month, so the help of Support Services would be greatly appreciated right now. Materials, supplies and equipment are also needed in order to complete the renovations. We need fire exit signs, smoke detectors and electrical conduits for the emergency lights, 2 ceiling fans, 6 screen doors, 2 shower fixtures for both sides, reseal both toilets, 2 light fixtures, 2 stoves, 1 refrigerator, 1 washer, 1 dryer, and 87 (12'x2.5') tin roofs. The roof needs to be water blasted and repair leaks (contractor needed), popped up tiles need to be repaired, left side of building needs a plywood replaced, need locksmith to unlock typhoon shutters, all electrical to be checked by an electrician, service all air conditioners by a AC repair person, a complete paint job of the inside and outside of building, remove all trash, and a 24000 BTU AC unit needs to be relocated to Ordot from Barrigada.
- **PERMIT** – Joe Guevera, Administrator/Inspector for DPW reported that GSJ does not need a permit to move into the Ordot House/Shelter.
- **TO DO LIST** - Support Service will have the Ordot House electricity certified, complete the plumbing work in the Left Wing shower, replace the tin roof in the front and back and replace the damaged wood, paint roof with silicone (since it's been water blasted), paint ceiling, repair front Left Wing window, unlock shutters, repair cabinets in left wing 2nd bedroom and repair sink in Left Wing. The following need to be purchased ASAP: 2 stoves, 1 refrigerator, 1 washer, 1 dryer, 6 screen doors, 2 smoke detectors and 1 fan. Move AC from Barrigada to Ordot.

We really do need a lot of help to complete the renovations at the Ordot Shelter so we can move in and increase the population to 12 clients.

Support Services Division has been informed of the needed work. A Shelter Manager is working closely with Support Services Division in regards to the renovation.
