WHEREAS, the Second Amendment and Second Option to Renew was signed by the Governor of Guam on June 24, 2020 in the amount of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000), for the term March 29, 2020 through March 28, 2021 with a remaining option to renew for two (2) additional terms of one year period; and

WHEREAS, the agreement allows for multiple certification of funds to be made in any fiscal year; and

** UNIFORM ALLOWANCE **

- 4) Within 30 days of receipt the Wage and Hour Division approves modifies or disapproves the action via transmittal to the agency contracting officer or notifies the contracting officer that additional time will be required to process the request.
- 5) The contracting officer transmits the Wage and Hour Division's decision to the contractor.
- 6) Each affected employee shall be furnished by the contractor with a written copy of such determination or it shall be posted as a part of the wage determination (See 29 CFR 4.6(b)(2)(iii)).
